Governor Signs Ex-Offender Bills

On July 17, at the South Side's Woodson Library, Governor Rod R. Blagojevich signed into law four bills that directly affect ex-offenders.

The first bill, Senate Bill 423, creates an automatic process to expunge overturned convictions from an individual's record. In the past, offenders who qualified to have their convictions overturned still had to apply for record expungement, a time-consuming process that hindered individuals' efforts to find housing and employment. Now overturned convictions will be expunged automatically. The bill was sponsored by Senator Kimberly Lightford (D-District 4) and Representative Larry McKeon (D-District 13).

Senate Bill 788, sponsored by Representative Connie Howard (D-District 34), provides that individuals arrested for misdemeanors who are acquitted, put on supervised release, or whose convictions are overturned can have their records sealed after three years, provided they have not been convicted for other offenses in the meantime.

Those convicted of misdemeanors can have their records expunged after four offense-free years. The bill excludes some crimes from expungement, including DUIs, sex offenses, violations of orders of protection, and crimes of violence.

The third piece of legislation, House Bill 3316, states that the Department of Human Services may, if funds permit, establish a pilot program in partnership with Illinois Department of Corrections to place "hard-to-employ persons," primarily ex-offenders, into employment.

When Lawndale (District 9) Representative Art Turner first introduced the bill, it required DHS to run one of the pilot programs in the Lawndale community. Subsequent House amendments deleted that provision, instead mandating that the DHS "give priority to areas of the State in which the concentration of released offenders is the highest." Our own District 5 Democrat Rickey Hendon sponsored the bill in the Senate.

Last Year for AmeriCorps in North Lawndale

Over the past 2 years, 22 AmeriCorps volunteers provided technical assistance to various community organizations in North Lawndale. Unfortunately, due to lack of funding at the national level, North Lawndale will not be hosting any AmeriCorps volunteers after October 1 of this year.

AmeriCorps is a national program that recruits over 40,000 volunteers each year to serve in communities across the U.S. In 2001, Illinois's Policy Research Action Group (PRAG) and its member universities, DePaul, Chicago State, UIC, and Loyola, were awarded a state grant to administer AmeriCorps projects in four Chicago IWA neighborhoods-North and South Lawndale, Humboldt Park, and Englewood.

The North Lawndale project began in September of 2001, coordinated through North Lawndale Employment Network by the Network's then-Associate Director, Lea Weems. Then in March of

2002, NLEN hired Victoria Cammon, formerly an AmeriCorps Volunteer in Humboldt Park, to take over the growing project as coordinator.

Over the last two years, AmeriCorps volunteers have worked roughly 35 hours per week for 12 months at one of 13 North Lawndale host sites, including the North Lawndale Restorative Justice Collaborative, The Crib Collective, The North Lawndale Learning Community, Lawndale Community Church, Neighbor-

hood Housing Services, AGAPE, North Lawndale YMCA, African American Aids Network, Save Up! IDA, Small Grants Initiative, North Lawndale College Prep, North Lawndale Employment Network and F.A.I.T.H Inc., which is located in the Austin area.

The volunteers at these organizations were paid through AmeriCorps. Full-time volunteers received a living allowance of 9,300 in 12 monthly installments as well as a \$4,725 AmeriCorps Education Award upon completion. They also received individual health insurance and, for those who were eligi-

ble, childcare assistance.

NLEN provided AmeriCorps volunteers to host organizations in North Lawndale at no cost. As hard-working, valuable, and cost-free staff members, these volunteers have been a great boon to their various organizations and to the North Lawndale community as whole.

Thus it is a great disappointment that, due to AmeriCorps budget cuts at a national level, North Lawndale will not be hosting an AmeriCorps Program this year, 2003-2004. This obviously has a huge impact on the community. Many organizations will not be able to replace their volunteers with paid staffers, and will lose those volunteers' services altogether.

To acknowledge the hard work of AmeriCorps volunteers, and to express how much their support will be missed in the coming year, NLEN will be hosting an "End of the Year Celebration" in honor of members completing the program. The last bill, House Bill 569, states that a one-time felony offender "may apply to the court or the Prisoner Review Board to seek a certificate of relief from disabilities as relates to bars to licensure imposed as a result of the offender's conviction," according to the law's official synopsis. These certificates of relief would only be provided for licenses in certain fields. The law was designed to reward good behavior by removing some work barriers imposed by the original offense. Representative Mary K. O'Brien (D-District 75) and Senator Barack Obama (D-District 13) sponsored the bill.

Two more bills pertaining to criminal justice were also signed; one requires police to record all interrogation sessions and confessions in homicide cases and the other mandates that police begin collecting data on the race of persons stopped on the road to calculate, and then eliminate, racial profiling.

"Each one of these six pieces of legislation stands as an important improvement to our criminal justice system," Blagojevich said during the signing. "But taken together, they represent a huge step forward in recognizing the rights of defendants and helping offenders re-enter society after they've served their terms."

Building Beyond! Graduation and Update

Congratulations! NLEN is excited to share that 7 more youth have completed the *Building Beyond!* training program. These seven youth started the program on May 5 and graduated on July 29, 2003. They learned a strong overview of the basic Microsoft Office Suite, including programs such as Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Access, FrontPage, and more! We are currently working with these youth on job placement assistance.

This group of young adults represent a diverse set of interests. Three participants would like to continue on with their IT training and are looking to begin an A+ certification course. Another participant is very interested in the health care field, specifically medical billing. She is excited to utilize the skills she learned towards that end. So

while these youth may not all enter the IT employment field, they all anticipate using the skills that they learned in a variety of different ways.

NLEN continues to work with participants who completed the program over the prior year. Over the past month alone we have sent clients out on more than 14 interviews.

The other exciting news is that NLEN began a revisioning process for the *Building Beyond!* program to assess its strengths and areas for improvement. We plan to start the newly revised program in late September. The new design will incorporate job shadowing, visits to area colleges, and an internship. We will keep our members updated as we continue with this process.

Building Beyond! is NLEN's out-of-school youth job training program offered

in partnership with the Neighborhood Technology Resource Center (NTRC) and Family Focus Lawndale.

Save Up! Helps Make Education Reality

Since October 2000, Save Up! has encouraged North Lawndale residents to invest in IDA (individual development account) savings plans that increase their access to home ownership and advanced education. Currently, 184 individuals have accounts that receive up to \$4000 in grant funds for money saved towards their future goals.

Save Up! enhances community programs by providing resources and guidance on financial planning towards higher education and home ownership. Many programs are available to families and communities that increase their earning potential by providing specialized training or career development. Participants use the Save Up! Program as an alternative to student loans because it may pay for trainings, fees, and supplies associated with their education.

IDA education plans may assist in paying for someone to attend **cosmetology school, truck driving (CDL) school, Certified Nursing Assistant Training, specialized certifications, and various two and four year college programs.** Each participant designs their own educational path with emphasis on personal goals and interest.

First Meeting of Going Home Initiative Steering Committee Held in July

The Illinois Department of Corrections, in partnership with North Lawndale Employment Network (NLEN) and Treatment Alternatives for Safe Communities (TASC), held the first **Going Home Initiative** Steering Committee meeting on Wednesday, July 9th at Sinai Community Institute.

The Going Home Initiative is an integrated system of ex-offender reentry services being piloted in Chicago's North Lawndale community. This program will build on existing services provided by IDOC and other government agencies in partnership with NLEN. The Going Home pilot program will serve 200 ex-offenders returning to North Lawndale.

The Steering Committee Meetings will be held quarterly to update the community on the progress of the Going Home Initiative and receive feedback about the program.

During the July 9th meeting, the Committee was given an overview and update of the initiative by Rick Guzman from the Illinois Department of Corrections. The two lead partners in the initiative, NLEN and TASC Inc., also gave presentations.

Organizations represented at the meeting included: Illinois Department of Correction, Illinois Criminal Justice Authority, The Chicago Police Department/ CAPS, The Mayor's Office of Workforce Development, The Department of Human Services, Illinois Department of Employment Services, Roosevelt University, Prison Relief Foundation, Family Focus, TASC, Chicago Christian Industrial League, In My Hands, Voices of The Ex-offender (VOTE), The Mayors Office of Workforce Development, SAFER Foundation, Chicago Public Schools, SJL/Strive, Chicago Project for Violence Prevention, Institute for Clinical Social Work, Lawndale Business and Local Development Corporation, Chicago Workforce Board, University of Illinois at Chicago, and several local residents. ♦

NLEN Job Center Will Open in Three Phases

NLEN and HICA are delighted to announce that we will soon be opening a job resource and workplace literacy center in North Lawndale. Both organizations believe this exciting initiative, funded by LISC and using the Project Match Job Center Service Model, will be a great asset for the North Lawndale community. However, the project is also extremely complicated. In light of this, NLEN has decided to open the Job Center in three phases, to allow the staff time to develop best practices and adjust policies and procedures.

In Phase One, NLEN will relocate its offices to the Job Center, which will allow greater connections between the organization and the surrounding community. Usage of the Center in the first phase will be reserved for NLEN clients in the Ex-Offender Employment Services program and the Building Beyond! Youth

program.

In Phase Two, the Job Center will open to NLEN's partner organizations and sub-contractors for referrals and other uses.

As Phase Three begins, the Job Center will be open up to walk-ins from the community. The same assistance given to NLEN clients and partners in Phases One and Two will be available to the community at this time.

In Phase One, the Job Center will offer job search-related resources, including newspapers and periodicals, computers with internet access, phone banks and voicemail services, a copy machine, a fax machine, and assistance in using these resources. By Phase Three, we anticipate providing other types of assistance, including linkages to GED, education, and training programs, job clubs, and career counseling.

Phase One is currently set to begin in October, and the time table for implementing the next two phases will be determined by experience. Opening the Center in phases will enable us to pilot our policies and procedures on a small scale; we will be able to make needed changes more quickly and easily and will avoid overwhelming our organization and staff's capacity. In short, our phased opening will ensure a better quality of service for all our present and future clients.

NLEN and HICA are working hard to get the center up and running in Phase One as soon as possible. Last month, the NLEN staff, HICA staff, and eight AmeriCorps volunteers renovated the future Job Center site for two days. We cleaned, scrubbed, painted, installed, planted, and assembled our way to a great looking Job Center. There is still more to be done, and the staff and volunteers will do another 2 days of renovation in late August. We are also developing policies and procedures for the Job Center, collecting resources, and carefully planning each element of Center programming.

The NLEN staff is very excited to open the Center, and all of us are working hard to prepare it for our clients. We hope to open it up to partners and then the community as soon as is feasible. We anticipate that the Center will be a great resource for the entire North Lawndale community.

New Focus on Economic Advancement

NLEN is pleased to announce the creation of a new department, the Economic Advancement Team (EAT), which will focus on demand side strategies for the economic advancement of Lawndale businesses and residents.

To develop the Lawndale workforce to meet modern employer needs, EAT plans to work closely with individual businesses to develop customized training programs to prepare residents for specific jobs.

EAT will also look into ways of creating employment opportunities by assisting start-up companies and by creating new business ventures itself. Anthony Burton, Director of Re-entry Services for NLEN explains that "with the increasing trend of background checks and policies that bar ex-offenders from jobs, Lawndale will most likely remain at a disadvantage as long as it is dependent upon outside businesses for economic stability.

However, by generating employment and implementing a model similar to San Francisco's Delancy Street Project, we control hiring policies that will allow people to get back to work."

The EAT team will also be dedicated to the advancement potential of NLEN clients. "A job is often just the first step on a long path to individual economic sustainability," explains Tom Wetzel, Director of Business Relations, who heads the new department. "The Job Resource Center will be a place where someone can continue searching for a more stable job while employed, and can also obtain links and information to receive skills training in order to make him or herself more competitive in the labor market, hence economic advancement."
